Agriculture and Climate Action

Draft Terms of Reference for NESC working group

March 2022

Context

The National Economic and Social Council has been requested by Government to undertake research on climate and agriculture in 2022. The Climate Action Plan 2021 action # 384 requests NESC to conduct research and engage on how to support climate just transition in agriculture.

Government commitments to legally binding greenhouse gas reductions of 51 per cent by 2030 and carbon neutrality by 2050 imply significant changes for the agricultural sector over the coming decade.

A key focus in the Climate Action Plan is on workable solutions which, in the case of agriculture and food, will result in tangible and significant reductions in emissions and improvements in biodiversity. The Climate Action Plan also views the principles of just transition as a useful lens for ensuring a collaborative approach to 'leaving no one behind' in the transition to carbon neutrality.

Approach

NESC will explore in practical terms how climate targets, and the transition that they imply for Irish agriculture, can be achieved in a manner that considers social equity and inclusion, environmental resilience (including biodiversity and water quality) and economic well-being. The project will consider agriculture within the wider context of land use, forestry and opportunities for rural development and regeneration.

The project will focus on:

• Framing Action: An understanding of how the challenge of climate action and transition is understood within the sector, with a focus on both opportunities as well as concerns (including economic, social and psychological); and the specific contextual, economic,

social, cultural and historical characteristics and linkages between the agricultural and forestry sectors.

- Mapping Options: An examination of the options and alternatives and costs in supporting
 ambitious climate action, informed by but not limited to the Teagasc MACC (marginal
 abatement cost curve); and, mapping of existing innovative approaches and areas of
 collaboration. Examination of options will include reflection on mitigation potential,
 environmental benefits (biodiversity, water quality) as well as farmer perspectives of
 feasibility from an economic, social or cultural perspective.
- Levers for Change: An assessment of the strengths and weaknesses of possible levers to support climate action and transition.

NESC will take a collaborative approach, engaging with a wide variety of stakeholders. The aim is to co-create solutions with a diversity of stakeholders including farmers and rural communities.

Terms of reference:

- Bring a practical, stakeholder-informed and solutions-focused perspective to explore
 how Irish agriculture can achieve climate targets to deliver transition to a net-zero
 economy and society that considers social equity and inclusion, environmental resilience
 and economic well-being.
- Advise on consultation with a wide variety of stakeholders, using bilateral interviews, focus groups and participatory stakeholder workshops.
- Deliver a report on Agriculture and Climate Action for Council approval by March 2023.

Working Group

A multi-stakeholder NESC working group will support and provide guidance on the work. Members will be drawn from the Council and a range of wider stakeholders, while staying within a manageable size for effective discussion, see Table 1. The working group will meet 4-6 times 2022 and once in 2023 online initially but in person where possible.
